ABOUT THE EXCHANGE

The Somerville Stock Exchange is a community forum, a fundraiser, and a different take on what a stock market can be.

"Stockholders" earn shares two different ways: by sharing what they're doing to make Somerville a better place in the forum; or by donating money to one of our partner nonprofits.

The forum: A way to earn stocks, and see what others are doing to make Somerville a better place

First, stockholders can get shares by sharing what they're doing to make Somerville a better place. This can include actions to make the community a better place, like helping a neighbor, or volunteering somewhere. Or doing something for the environment, like composting or riding a bike. Or doing something for the city's creative life—like volunteering at an arts event, or writing a play, or being in a band.

All of this information then goes into the project's forum—where others can read them, and get inspired. The forum will also make a nice snapshot of what Somerville is all about.

How stocks work

Stocks aren't really worth any money—they're more of an indicator of how active people are in Somerville's community, environment, and creative life.

When stockholders tell us good things they've done for the city, stock prices go up. When we find out things that have negatively affected Somerville, stock prices go down.

Think of it as a game. Or a metaphor.

Who's behind this

This project is run by Somerville artist Tim Devin. All proceeds from the sale of shares go to one of three Somerville nonprofits: the Somerville Homeless Coalition; Somerville Climate Action; and the Somerville Arts Council.

Next, she did research on what the bank needed to become accessible and got buy-in from bank managers and senior staff about this community need. They, in turn, got an agreement from their landlord and performed the design and construction. Because of her work, the Bank's stone step front landing was ground down to create an accessible and integrated front entrance and door; their parking lot was restriped, providing the necessary handicap parking spots; and the bank purchased a lower table for smaller people and wheelchair users, and changed their policies and procedures to accommodate individuals and families with disabilities

The Green Line expansion took two important (Positive) steps forward in early May 2012. First, the city of Somerville began buying property for the expansion. Second, Boston Meteropolitan Planning Organization approved \$8.1M in funding for the Route 16 Green Line station.

Joe Beckmann has a long-standing involvement in (Positive) local politics and education issues. He began by serving on Capuano's Affordable Housing Task Force. This lead to him working with the Board of the Somerville Homeless Coalition, the Community Action Agency of Somerville, and the Somerville Community Corporation. He also did consulting for

the Regional Employment Board, which lead to interactions with the School Committee and the High School School Council. This experience, in turn, got him involved in politics in and out of schools--such as helping with some races for Aldermen and School Committee; working with teacher unions and educational tech advocates; working with people at the Harvard School of Education, Tufts and MIT; doing consulting work with media advocates and the Democratic Ward and City Committee-- and even working as an evening school and substitute teacher. Jonah Petri actively advocates on transportation issues, mostly related to the extension of the Community Path to Lechmere and the Charles River.

Michael Messina helped run interactive (Positive) Somerville's Green Line Challenge. Residents were encouraged to brainstorm ideas for improving Gilman Square, which is near one of the proposed Green Line stops. The Challenge was aimed at getting residents involved in the planning process

On May 20th, **Progress Together** had a (Positive) "community congress," to decide what to do next. Over 50 parents got together to decide what the organization could do next for local education issues, now that it has successfully fought a proposed charter school. While they didn't decide on a single course of action, they all agreed to remain together as an organization, and explore what they could do next.

On May 19th, the Arts Council put together the (Neutral) second annual **Porch Fest.** Over 100 musicians gave free concerts from front porches of homes in Somerville. Many residents liked the feel of the event, and the chance to meet their neighbors. Others thought it was too loud, and disturbed their weekend.

A new study showed that almost **14.7% of** (negative) **Somerville** lives below the poverty line. This is slightly less than the national average (15.1%), but well above the state average of 10.5%.

Libby is on the board of Somerville Community (Positive) Corporation because she wants to be more engaged in the way Somerville is developed so that it stays unique and diverse, and doesn't become any less affordable.

Cambridge Health Alliance's (CHA) Somerville (Positive) Hospital Campus runs the **Spring Hill Garden**. The garden is in a lot behind the hospital that hadn't previously been used. The food grown there is given to local pantries and resident programs.

Jacy Edelman is organizing a benefit bike ride for the Welcome Project (a local nonprofit that "builds the collective power of Somerville immigrants to participate in and shape community decisions"). The event is called the "Tasting Tour of Somerville," and will take place on September 8, 2012.

Sprout & Co. has submitted a proposal for an (Positive) alternative high school in Somerville, one that will focus on science, technology, engineering, and mathematics. The prospectus was approved by a screening committee; the group is now working on an actual plan for the school. According to their website, Sprout & Co. is a "community education and research organization devoted to creating and supporting the community-driven learning, teaching, and investigation of science"; their studio is just outside of Davis Square.

Hubway, the bike sharing company, recently (Positive) expanded into Somerville. By letting people rent bikes easily, the company provides a healthy, environmentally-friendly way for people to get around town.

AUGUST 16 – SEPTEMBER 1, 2012

Neutral As a volunteer in Somerville and beyond, Nia (Positive) DeYounge has served the "We Got Next: Young Christian Adult Empowerment Movement," the Roxbury International Film Festival, and currently serves as a board member of the Somerville Arts Council. In her own words she says, 'You know you really love doing something if you'll do it for free!' Through volunteering, she has been able to explore Boston, meet people with similar interests, and contribute to grassroots movements that strengthen communities and strive to make the Greater Boston area a welcoming place to live and work. She believes in the power of individuals to celebrate life while making change, and in the importance of building societies that thrive not only on monetary capital, but on meaningful social interactions and cultural exchanges.

Rents in Somerville, and in Greater Boston in (negative) general rose higher this year -- a full 7% higher areawide than last year, while available units dropped from 3.8% to 3.1%. This means harder times for renters all around the city.

Christopher Boucher began working at Metro Pedal Power two years ago because he believes in the viability of pedal power in the city that goes beyond commuting. During his time at MPP, Christopher has hauled recycling, transported furniture, delivered vegetables and collected compost. Delivering via bicycle or pedal trucks brings you closer to folks on the road and always sparks a conversation with customers.

The **Nave Gallery** organized an event called (Positive) "Yarnstorming" in Perry Park on Saturday, August 25th. Volunteers wrapped trees, poles and fences in the park with hand-knitted pieces. The event was designed to raise awareness for the Somerville Homeless Coalition; the yarn pieces will stay up until November.

A new study by the **Chronicle of Philanthropy** looked into how much Americans give to charities and nonprofits, and broke the results down by area. The **Boston metro area** ranked 49th-- which means that almost every other metro area in the country is more generous towards charities and nonprofits than we are.

Worse, **Somerville** reportedly gave at a lower rate (2.9% of discretionary income) than both Cambridge (4.2%) and Boston (4.5%).

The **Boston metro area** was named one of the (negative) most racist cities in America by online news source **Gawker**. While the article represented the opinion of one journalist, it is also an allegation that seems to keep coming up, and that seems to be shared by quite a large number of people. And can that many people be wrong?

Somerville celebrated its 7th annual **Fluff Festival**, (positive) in Union Square. The Festival was in honor of marshmallow fluff, which was invented in Somerville. There were bands, vendors, games, and food.

Suzanne Lubeck reuses the plastic bags that her (Positive) newspaper comes in as pooper-picker-uppers. She puts them in a pink plastic bag container from IKEA that she added ot the fence of the dog park at the corner of Vinyl and Summer Streets. They are for everyone to use. Suzanne has a basket at home where she can quickly stash the plastic bags when she gets her newspaper. When the basket is full, she restocks the container at the park. No, she dooesn't have a dog; she went with a friend once and think it's the craziest thing in the world to take a brand new plastic baggie from the stand for a two second poop pick up duty. These newspaper bags are the perfect size, clean and even come in pretty colors.

The Somerville Homeless Coalition had its annual (Positive) 5k race fundraiser.

MJND is a Somerville resident who composts her (Positive) food scraps, and recycles paper and plastic. She uses reusable shopping bags. She also has metal cups and utensils at work, so she doesn't have to use disposable ones. All of this cuts down on the amount of trash she makes.

On April 11, the **city** of Somerville announced that (Positive) the Board of Alderman is working on zoning laws to encourage urban agriculture. This would allow farms (including indoor ones) to operate in Somerville.

Megan R. spent 30 minutes pulling up Garlic Mustard (an invasive weed that is seeding right now) at Lexington Park while her daughter played.

Jonah Petri composts almost everything, and then recycles what he can. As a result, he only creates one bag of garbage every other week (for two people and a baby!). He bikes to work nearly every day (even during snowpocalypse last year); and when he can't bike, he takes the T. He has never driven to work, not even once! He bought a whole house electricity monitor, and uses it to study and minimize his electricity use. At night, his whole house draws 70 watts—which is less than a single computer & monitor.

The **Environmental Protection Agency** gave its annual "report card" evaluation of the Mystic River. It received a "D" grade. The overall quality of the river is pretty poor—due, in part, to the over 14,000 gallons of sewage that are dumped into it each year from local storm drains. The river's grade should increase this year, when the storm drains will cease emptying into the river.

Sarah Howard runs Somerville-based Earthos (Positive) institute, a nonprofit that promotes regional resource self sufficiency. She helps communities build local, cooperative economies with vibrant urban spaces. She hopes that one day communities around the

world will know how to strategically use their resources (water, energy, arable land, biodiversity, people capital) to improve well-being of all, while respecting the limits of ecosystems. This summer she will also try to improve her own food growing skills, to do her part to reduce dependence on food imports from water scarce regions like California.

To date, GCG has installed over 350 gardens. Jessie's work is fueled by her passion for food, farming, and sustainability.

Mark Winterer is a co-founder of Recover Green (Positive) Roofs, a design/build/maintain firm, building green roofs and walls on residential and commercial buildings. Green roofs create more green space in urban environments and help minimize the environmental impact of buildings.

The Growing Center gave a workshop on how to compost your food scraps (which is a way to recycle unused food, so that it doesn't end up in a landfill). This was one of many free workshops and events the Center hosts.

JUNE 16 – JULY 1, 2012 Positive/ Negative/ Neutral Reason Jenna Stark is an avid biker and uses it as her (Positive) primary form of transportation. Steven Nutter and the Somerville Climate Action (Positive) depaved his backyard in October 2010. Now it is used as a private community garden growing everything from popcorn to brussel sprouts to bees. He does this because he loves food! Additionally, the three adults who live on the property don't own cars (neither do his neighbors). The idea of having the entire yard paved for parking didn't seem like a good use of space. Finally, without a yard to mow, he can save money and spend his weekends having eating fresh food with friends! The city of Somerville launched a new website (Positive) called "Somerville Urban Ag." It features information and tips on urban agriculture, and is part of the city's push to encourage more urban growing. Mark Winterer planted grass seed on bare ground (Positive) thereby increasing the permeability of the ground. This means the ground will absorb storm water instead of the storm water running right over the

bare ground.

In June, **Tim Devin** and **MJND** helped remove the paving from someone's driveway, because the home-owner wanted to use the land as a garden. The US Court of Appeals upheld the **Environmental** (Positive) **Protection Agency's new rules** on greenhouse gases (emissions that pollute the air, and add to global heat levels). These new rules will affect the emissions created by factories, power plants and cars. They will limit how much carbon dioxide newlybuilt factories can produce, and lays the groundwork for new standards on car emissions.

LuQ went to Armory farmer's market once a month in winter. Christopher Reichert depaved his property on (Positive) Bigelow St. He installed 3 new trees, and reduced hard surface by 95%. It is now a useful garden. Mycitygardens.com lets homeowners with extra (Positive) yard space connect with others in their community who want to have space to garden. It has members in Somerville. Take a look if you'd like to connect
